
San Gabriel Christian Church History of its Buildings And Congregations

The following narrative gives a brief history of the San Gabriel Christian Church, its locations, its founders, and a few of the trials overcome by the members. This history gives meaning to this churches feeling that we exists now because of the "Faith of our Fathers."

The location of this present church is on F.M. 421 on the west side of Milam County. It is in the small agricultural community called San Gabriel .If you travel from Austin East on State Highway 79 to Thorndale, Texas, take a left at the light onto F.M. 486, stay on F. M. 486 till you reach FM 421 in San Gabriel. Take a left turn and go one block. The church is on the right.

The soil here is black and rich, from two to ten feet deep in some places. There are many rivers running through this part of the county. Some of these are the San Gabriel River, Little River, Brazos, and many smaller creeks, such as the Brushy, Turkey Creek, Alligator and Pecan Creek. The San Gabriel River has three different branches that have their beginning in southwest Williamson County and join together in the town of Georgetown, Texas. This river runs through the east side of Williamson into the west side of Milam County

In the early 1700s, the land around the San Gabriel area was inhabited by various Indian tribes. They are an important part of our local history as are some of the events that happened to them.

The land was heavily forested near the many rivers and streams. The plains adjacent to the rivers and streams had a rich black soil covered by tall prairie grasses. The

river running through the fertile valley was called the San Javriel. (as well as San Xavier and many years later the San Gabriel.) Fray Isidro Felix Espinosa gave names to the San Gabriel River and Brushy Creek. He called them the San Javril and Arroyo de Las Benditas Animas in 1716. He camped on the banks of both streams. It is believed by some that other Spanish and French explorers had been in the area before this. The river was spring fed and received run-off from many creeks and sloughs flowing into it. The fish were abundant and the water clear, running over a gravel bottom. 1

It must have been a favorite area for some of the Indian tribes for there is still evidence of their being here. This writer has land on the San Gabriel River where many fine flint articles have been found. Usually these were found after several inches of rain had fallen and washed them loose from the soil on the bank. There are still huge old native pecan trees here and gentle sloping banks leading to the river. This was an ideal place for camping, sitting on the bank and working on hunting weapons, washing, cooking, and bathing. There were walnuts, pecans, dewberries, mulberries and large catfish and other fish. It had abundant wild game on the prairie such as buffalo, deer, wild horses, turkey, quail, and squirrels. It did and still does have a great many of these things except buffalo and wild horses.

The names of some of these tribes in this area were the Lipan Apache, Coco, Tonkawa, Mayeye, Deadose, Bidai, Orcoquiza, Hierbipiame, Karankawa, Yojuane, and the fierce Comanche. 2

It was because of these Indians that the Catholic Church decided to send Friars into the area. These Friars would become the first European settlers in the area. In the 18th century, El Cuilon petitioned Martin de Alarcon about missions being established

among the Ranchera Grande. A priest from the College of Santa Cruz de Queretaro, Fray Mariano Francisco de los Delores y Viana (who in 1733 and 1734 had already met some of the Indian tribes on the Brazos) pressed hard for action to be taken on establishing missions. He wanted a mission on the San Xaviar. In January 1746, he went to the area with some soldiers and mission Indians and had founded a mission before April 13, 1746. He chose a spot about 2 miles west of where Arroyo Animas, now called Brushy Creek, enters the San Xaviar. They received Royal permission for the proposed Mission in December, 1747. They received permission to build three missions in this area.³

The Texas missions had a hard time, especially the ones on the San Xavier. They were so far into the interior of Texas which was very close to the Apache. The Apache kept harassing the Mission and its Indian converts. Some of the Mission Indians were killed as well as three soldiers. The Mission Indians ran away to the woods, but were finally talked back to the Mission by Father Mariano.

In February of 1749, the Mission San Idelfonso was being finished near the juncture of the San Xavier River and Las Animas. There were nine missionaries put in charge of the Coco Indians until the Candelaria Mission was finished. The Indians left the Mission for a time and returned to their old camp near the Brazos and Colorado. They became ill with smallpox and measles. The missionaries talked them into returning to the Mission. The third mission, Nuestra de Senora de la Candelaria was finally finished on April 14, 1749. All of the Missions were built on the south side of the river to help keep them away from the warring Apache.

This was a fruitful area, but the soldiers were unhappy and lonely. They had a lot of discipline problems. In June of 1750, Lieutenant Jose Jouquin de Eca y Musquiz

surveyed the Missions to see if they should be moved. He recommended moving them, but no action was taken. The planned irrigation project and dam on the San Xaviar was begun on October 12, 1750. On March 30, 1751, the needed presidio was finally started. It was placed "two gunshots" up river from the San Xavier Mission. These missions and other Texas missions did well until the end of 1751 when a new captain came to the San Xavier Presidio. His name was Don Felipe de Rabago. He was guilty of bad conduct while coming from Mexico to Central Texas. When he was in San Antonio, he had a "liaison" with the wife of one of his men. . When they reached the presidio, he had the man imprisoned and tortured. When told to ask for forgiveness, he ignored the Friars. Some of his men were also guilty of bad conduct and refused to repent. Things were beginning to be difficult at the Missions. When one of the Coco Indians was beaten by the soldiers, the rest of the tribe ran away. Fray Jose Ganzabal excommunicated Rabago. He ignored the Fray's message. Juan Jose Zavallos, the husband of the woman Rabago had a liaison with, was killed by a blunderbuss while talking to Fray Ganzabal in the doorway. Fray Ganzabal was killed by an arrow. The rest of the missionaries fled the Mission. One of the Indian residents of San Xaviar confessed that he and four soldiers were told by Rabago to commit the murders.⁴

One of the priests wrote about seeing a huge fireball which circled from Presidio to the Mission and back to the Presidio where it exploded with a huge blast. He told of the river drying up and the land becoming uninhabitable because of drought and disease. The Missions were finally closed in 1756 and moved to San Saba. These were also struck by disaster. On a visit to the San Gabriel mission sites in 1907, historian Herbert Bolton found the remains of the unfinished dam and rubble from the missions. He said that the

rock used in the San Gabriel School and some chimneys in the area were from the old Mission. The rock San Gabriel School was built in 1936 by the Work Project Administration.⁵

Some of the Indians that Sterling Robertson's colonials encountered in the late 1820s and 1830s were probably a continuation of the tribes who were inhabitants of the Spanish Missions along the San Gabriel River. ⁶

The present name of San Gabriel evolved from San Javriel, a name used by some earlier explorers as well as Stephen F. Austin in 1828, as he spelled the name on the map he drew as San Javriel. His notes used the same spelling for the name. Our community, located on both the north and south side of the river, eventually evolved into the town of San Gabriel⁷

Early settlers wanted to settle in this fertile black land area and found it was under the rule of the Mexican government. The Mexican government wanted to settle the area, but only with settlers who were Catholic, or who would convert to Catholicism. Abigal McLennan Fokes received a league of land out of the J.J. Liendo Survey on November 2, 1835. It extended to both sides of the San Gabriel River and included land where all three future San Gabriel Christian Churches would be built.⁸

The area's Indian tribes were still a problem and often caused trouble. One of these incidents involved the McLennan family in 1835 soon after they arrived at their landsite. Mr. John McLennan was Abigal Fokes' brother⁹ and received his land grant in 1835. The Indians attacked their camp capturing McLennan's wife Margaret and their

two youngest children while John and his son were hunting. They managed to escape when Margaret was able to undo their bonds while she had kept them all hidden in a small cave till the Indians left. They returned to the camp where Mr. McLennan found them a few days later. ¹⁰ There are several different stories about this incident. One of them includes three of Abigail Fokes' six children as well as the McLennan children. ¹¹

Other early settlers were the Mercer brothers, Peter and Jesse. They began building a log cabin on the banks of the San Gabriel River near the present community of San Gabriel in 1844. Mercer was one of the owners of the building in Washington on the Brazos where the convention of 1836 had met and signed the Declaration of Independence. Peter Mercer was killed by Indians who attacked him and his brother near their cabin close to the river. Abigal Fokes set aside land for a cemetery near the San Gabriel River on the top of a hill. Peter Mercer's grave was the first plot in the Locklin cemetery. Many of our members have family buried in this old and well maintained cemetery. Settlers began moving into the area soon after this, even with the constant threat of Indian attack.

A small group of "Campbellites" joined together on each Lord's Day to hear God's Word and thus gain the strength to face another week of hardship. In the 1850s, the little band of Christians became larger, and with strong leadership the church began to outgrow the homes where they were meeting. In June, 1854, Martha Kolb, (who with her husband, Peter, ran a mill on Kolb Hill and a toll bridge across the Brushy Creek ¹³ was baptized by Evangelist Newman during a meeting. The congregation began to plan a church building and reorganization of their fellowship. This small group, like so many

others during those times, was unable to have a full-time minister. They depended on traveling ministers for their meetings. This church was very fortunate to have strong leaders in their group who kept them going between these visits by ministers. Old church records say that Mr. Newman was a regular visitor to the area in 1854, 55, 56, 57, and 58 baptizing many other converts. In 1854, Martha Kolb was the first recorded baptism in our group, and she is buried in San Andres cemetery (between San Gabriel and Rockdale). A picture of her tombstone is in the back of this document. Martha was born on August 27, 1834, and died on March 30, 18-4 (the third number was unclear on the old stone). ¹⁴

In 1859, the San Gabriel group was reorganized. At the end of this document are copies of some of these "burned records" meticulously copied by Mrs. Cenia Camp and her daughter, Isabelle Jackson with a signed statement by Mrs. Camp explaining where they were obtained. We have included copies of some of these early records, in her hand, that include the first members of the reorganized church. A list is given of each of the pastors and evangelists. Some of them are very well known to those of us familiar with Thorp Springs and the fledgling college which had its roots there. Some of the men who held meetings at the San Gabriel Christian Church Fellowship were:

1878 - Meeting by Randolph Clark & Father & Williams,

1879- Addison Clark & Pennington,

1880-1886 J.A. Lincoln and W.K. Hamblen,

1881-Meeting by A.C. Mathis & Hamblen,

1892-Baptisms by Addison Clark.

Many references to these men are found in these and other books about Add-Ran College or Texas Christian University "Texas Disciples" published TCU press," pp. 143, 145, 146, 147, 148 and "Religion on the Texas Frontier" pp.73-103. [Copies of old files 1854-1904 are in the appendix].

These are others who helped to guide our early fathers and mothers in matters of faith: The ones information could be found on were J.A. Lincoln, W. K. Hamblin, J.W. Hamblen, Dr. Kendrick, and Sampson Connell.

J. A. Lincoln was born in 1846 in Lincoln County, Tennessee. Mr. Lincoln came to Texas in March of 1850 with his family and is seen in our records quite often as a member, evangelist, and later as pastor in the mid and late 1800's. A letter from J. A. Lincoln to his son Elmer, an attorney, was found in which he tells of those early days.

"Our lot was hard and we were poor and father was trying to pay for a place, but just three miles away from home was a little band of disciples (called "Campbellites") who met every Lords Day. My mother would let me go over and play with "A good boy", but this good boys mother would make both of us go over and meet with that little band and I soon took it all in and was ready to argue mother out of Baptisms and father out of Hard Shellism, but they would not let me argue when I was getting the best of it, but I kept slipping in pointed passages.

"In 1860 Dr. Kendrick was going to hold a "camp meeting" in three miles of our home and I told father about it and I proposed to keep the baby and other children while he and mother attended. They began going on Friday night and continued till Monday night when they both made the "good confession" On their return home I heard them say "this is a new turn in our lives and we must live up to it." I jumped out of bed and shouted for the first and last time in my life. My father had been a rough man and ruled us children with an iron rod, but he soon became the most tender-hearted, loving father I ever knew. Oh how often I've been with him in meetings since and saw his consecrated tears roll down his cheeks and his lips moving in prayer while I was preaching! But he rests in peace.

"Father and mother expected me to make the confession at the same meeting but I deferred it until July, the third Sunday night in 1861, when Brother Pennington, a gawky young preacher was preaching, and I was baptized the next

day by W. F. Hamblin [W. K Hamblen]. Thus I began my career as a Christian at 15 years of age. I kept on doing the best I could, till the latter part of 1862, when I had to go into the army (Civil War). The circumstances of my going into the army were peculiar. My father was conscripted, but I was not of age to go but I proposed to go in his place and make a good soldier, but he refused until I told him plainly I would not stay and take the burden of the family and if he went I would go in a different direction. At Austin on the first roll call I refused to answer "to fathers name". I made them insert mine, then procured an unlimited furlough for father, and he never served a day in the army and I filled my own place as a volunteer. At the close of the (Civil War) he was happy and so was I. I have never been able to tell which I was better adapted for, the evangelistic work or a pastorate, though I have succeeded in the evangelistic very well, having baptized 11,678 persons. And now, as I am in the closing years of my life, my children may want to know if I had my life to live over would I pursue the same course-most assuredly. "Had I ten thousand hearts to give, Lord they should all be thine." Your father, J. A. Lincoln." (Letter from J. A. Lincoln) ¹⁶

There were many who had a great influence on the development of the Disciples of Christ as it began to evolve from the pioneer isolation years of meeting in each others' homes and having no organization in their group. They had very little connection to other church organizations other than evangelist who brought word about developments in other churches. During these years we were known as "Campbellites." When we formally organized in 1859, our old records refer to us as the "Church of God in San Gabriel and Brushy Creek," Milam County, Texas, organized on the Third Lord's Day in June, 1859, Wm. K. Hamblen and Sampson Connell, Elders. The charter members of our church were:

This was the beginning. The church continued in the years following the reorganization in 1859. On February 24, 1884, J. W. Hamblen donated two acres of land to build a church on. The deed for this land was found at the Milam County Courthouse in: DIR Vol. 12, pp. 287 & 288 showing 2 acres deeded to the Deacons, Jacob Isaac, Hugh Moore, Richard Murry, and Wm. Barclay for the San Gabriel Christian Church by J. W. Hamblen.

Sampson Connell was also elected Elder in 1859. At the young age of 15 he went with his father to take supplies to the Alamo. It is believed that these supplies were the last to make it to the Alamo. Samson and Missouri Connell were both members when the church reorganized in 1859. In the early 1860s, Samuel could not join in the Civil War because of a disability. He did join in the Milam Co. Militia serving in the Home Guard during the Civil War. His father and his brother David took part in the Battle of San Jacinto. Sampson Connell became a good farmer and built a log cabin for his family. He and his wife Missouri had ten children .¹⁸

A picture of J. W. Hamblen is found in the appendix. (The sketch of the first church was put on commemorative plates for our 100th Anniversary Celebration. The original sketch is in our history book, Faith of our Fathers. The sketch was done by A. M. Garrat.) In his biography, Mr. John Hamblen tells of a very frightening episode he experienced at the age of fourteen. In history it was known as the "Run-away Scrape." This was the flight of the settlers as Santa Anna began his march through Texas in the spring of 1836. The Hamblen family had many hardships and much sadness during that hasty escape. Mrs. Hamblen had a two-day-old child when her family loaded she, the new baby, and the other children in a wagon. With the haste, fright and confusion during that trip, they lost three of their children and another child died shortly after they were able to return home. In 1848 they came to Milam County. They were among the first settlers along the San Gabriel River near the present town of San Gabriel.¹⁹

John Hamblen and his wife were both members of this Disciples of Christ congregation. John recorded in his biography that, "his mother's long and exceptionally pious and useful life in its service...and under its influence and teaching all the children of his brothers and sisters and his own have been reared.." ²⁰His mother made this her home until her death on December 1878 when she was eighty three. "John W. Hamblen's name must stand always in the history of Milam County as one of her worthiest citizens. While he has not been a public character, he has been a maker of history. He has seen the rugged forests and wild prairies reduced to cultivated and arable fields. Identified with

the county while it was Mexican territory, he has lived to see many changes, and to be an active participant in both the peaceful and violent revolutions that went on around him, living under five governments: Mexican, Texas, United States, Confederate and again, United States. He witnessed the gradual expulsion of the red man and the steady advancement of the white race. He occupied Texas soil when the people cast off Mexican government. He saw the country change from a dependency to an independent republic, and was not an uninterested spectator when the new but vigorous republic asked for admission to the American Union. He witnessed the movement that made Texas free and the peaceable settlement by which she became one of the sisterhood of States; and he has lived long enough to know that this State is destined to become the greatest in the American galaxy."²¹ He was a leader in his community and his county as well as the San Gabriel Christian Church. He and his brother, Wm. K. Hamblen, had a little mercantile store in the community at one time. Their business interests were varied and successful. Wm. K. Hamblen was born October 22, 1817, in Virginia and raised in Tennessee. He later located in Milam County in 1848 and became a member of the Christian Church in 1856. He became their minister in 1860. John and William Hamblen had a large herd of cattle running on the river bottoms of the San Gabriel and on the prairie. He married Mrs. S. C. Blakemore. They had four children. His wife Mary died in 1863. He remarried in 1864 .The Hamblens had 14 children. About 1890, W. K. Hamblen felt he should move to a town where his children could receive a good education. He and John liquidated the cattle partnership and he and his family moved to Salado, Texas. In Bell and Milam Counties he owned large tracts of land. He died on September 12, 1902. His wife, Alice Gray Hamblen, died January 16, 1932. The Hamblen brothers were both very successful

in business and in land.²² They were especially interested in holding the little band of "Campbellites" together as the group began to grow. Wm. K. Hamblen and John W. Hamblen were both Elders. The minutes of Clerk C. N. Fokes state:" Wm. K. Hamblen, set apart to the work of an Evangelist by fasting, prayer, and the laying on of hands on this 7th Day of August 1861."²³

The story is told in the Clark family about the time when James Asbury Clark walked into this area back in the 1850s. He stopped at the Hamblen home place where he was welcomed into the house but admonished that he was welcome to partake of their supper but Hamblen's wife and son were to get what little bacon they had. James A. Clark soon joined the little congregation. The Clark family continues to be a part of this on going work. Many family members are still actively supporting the present church. ²⁴

The members built their "Old White Church," as it is now called, on a hill between Pecan Creek and the San Gabriel River. It was near where Pecan Creek joins the river.

In 1984 this story was told to me by Ned Culp, an Elder in our church. He related what his father, John Franklin Culp, had told him about an incident at the Little White Church. During a storm, lightening struck the church, and it caught fire. Members joined together to make a bucket brigade from the river. Mr. Culp was one of those on the roof of the church. They were pulling away burning shingles from the roof and dousing it with the buckets of water. The amazing part of his being there was that he had a crippled leg. He yelled down to the men in the bucket brigade that if they didn't hurry,



it was going to burn to the ground. ²⁵ Evidently the fire had created much damage to the church, the roof, interior, and its contents, (including the records). The men of the church managed to put out the fire and to salvage the burned church records which were later copied by Mrs. Cenia Whitfield Camp. She found them in the possession of Mr. C. N. Fokes, of San Marcos, Texas. The former Church Clerk had kept these old burned and singed records. Statements received from Brother J. K.P. Barclay, Ella Lincoln Simms, daughter of John A. Lincoln, and from Alice Hamblen Porter daughter of Wm. K. Hamblen are in accord with these dates. These record leaves are old and yellow with age. The outside edges are burned showing that someone rescued them from the flames. Isabel Camp Jackson finished copying the old records after the death of her mother on January 13, 1936. ²⁶

Several years after the fire at the Old White Church, the congregation moved to the north side of the river; however, the actual reason for the congregations' move is not known. I am sitting at my desk, looking out the picture window at a scene showing an overflowing Pecan Creek. This gives me a very good idea why this Old White Church was abandoned in favor of a new location. I happen to own the property where the first Church was located. It was on a hill in the fork of the Pecan Creek and the San Gabriel River. Every time we have a heavy rain storm, Pecan Creek races across the area out of its bank. It joins the river to the right of my place. This means in a storm the church was inaccessible. If members were there they could not get out for some time.

This is a recent picture taken after a 4" rain west of Jayne Thompson's house.

On February 16, 1901, a meeting was held and the church decided by a 102 member vote to move the services to the other side of the river. The location was in the village of San Gabriel. The decision was made by a 2/3 majority with 68 voting for and 34 against. They met in the old three-room San Gabriel School. On February 24, 1901, a building committee was elected. On this day, J.A. Clark was reinstated as an Elder, having been elected as an Elder in the Christian Church of San Gabriel, Texas, prior to this. Services were held in the old school for some time while plans were made to build the new church.²⁷

The land for the new church was donated by Henry F. and Lucy Baird. It was 1½ acres out of the Abigal Fokes Survey to Elders of the San Gabriel Christian Church, Dr. F. M. Whitfield, C.N. Fokes, and J. A. Clark-July 29, 1901 Vol. 61 pp. 399 400-401 Milam County, Texas.

"In 1866 San Gabriel consisted of one home, that of Mr. Bill Barclay. He was a bachelor at that time. He was the postmaster, Justice of the Peace, and storekeeper, all in

his home. He owned 88 acres in and adjoining San Gabriel.—Henry Francis Baird and Lucy Ann Rigsby married March 26, 1867 in Garrard County, Kentucky. They left shortly after that time for Texas. Arriving in Cameron, Texas. Henry went to the County Judge at the court house asking about jobs near by. The County Judge sent him to Tom Felton's ranch near San Gabriel. He began work for him splitting rails and building fence for .50 cents a day. They lived in a little one room cabin. They met Mr. Will Glasscock at church and about one and a half years later received 100 acres from Mr. Glasscock to plant cotton and all he could grub and cultivate free for one year. This was his beginning. He was able to buy a section of land from Mr. John Hamblen at \$18.00 an acre. He paid for it as you would pay rent, 1/3 corn, 1/4 cotton raised. The land had to be cleared before it could be cultivated.

Henry and Lucy Baird had 15 children. There were 7 boys and 8 girls. All helped to work the land. They maintained about one and a half acres as a home garden. About fifteen hogs a year were butchered in the winter for their meat. The children of Henry and Lucy Baird were: Joseph David, Emma Frances, Martha Susan, Henry Samuel, Lura Belle, Oliver Perry, Eliza May, Lucy Ora Alma, Archie Logan, James William, Myrta Ellen, Nora Lacey, Andrew Franklin, and Clarence Augustus. ²⁸ The Baird family still attends the San Gabriel Christian Church. Currently, Lucy Baird Shelton is an Elder, the Secretary of the San Gabriel Christian Church, and Music Director. Many other members of the family are also active members

The congregation chose Ed Sontag to be their contractor and local labor was used.

The records show that most of the supplies and labor were donated. The list in the

Church minutes show the following donations: Seats for Church House, Donations for

The first meeting was held in the new building (second actual building) on November 10, 1901, with Dr. Whitfield conducting the service and W. H. Floore giving the first sermon in the new house. One of our old record books indicates the church had a strong Christian Women's Board of Missions. In July 1912 the group numbered 26. In 1914 their record book shows these ladies picked cotton together to reach their Mission goal.³⁰

Mrs. Mildred Culp remembered the summer camp meetings held at the river each summer at the Penn Tabernacle and the revivals at the Baird Brush Arbor. My father, Harry W. Clark, told us about his memories of those days. He said that he and some of the boys would go down to a spring on the bank of the river. They would duck under the water and clean it out then would jam a barrel over it. The barrel would fill with water and they would dip it out with buckets 'til it was clear. Then people got their drinking water from that barrel.

Mrs. Mildred Culp said every one took baskets of food, quilts and other supplies to the river in their wagons. "During those early years till somewhere around September 1921 meetings were called, "Camp Meetings." They were held every summer at the Penn Tabernacle, which was near San Gabriel on the north side of the river.. Local people from all churches and some who had moved away came and camped for ten days. Traditionally this began on Friday night before the third Sunday in July of every year. No notification had to be sent to anyone. Crops were usually "laid by", but some men who came had to return home in the afternoon to feed and water their mules. Cows or chickens, gather eggs, milk or turn the cows and calves out together. There was no electricity so the best

light available was a flickering windblown gas light. At night parents with children would locate themselves around the outer edge of the tabernacle so a palate could be spread out for them to sleep on. On Sunday everyone would come with baskets bulging with food and white starched tablecloths would be spread on the ground in a long line and lunches would be spread on these. No thought was given to the inconvenience or the backbreaking work it took. I guess that was before the time of flies, mosquitoes, and ants! The afternoon was spent in visiting, singing and resting. Before church-time the remains of lunch were spread out again. Food poisoning and the bacteria which caused foods to spoil must not have been known about either! Most mothers had to change their childrens' clothes before time for night services for them to be presentable. Before the meeting began the men would go down and re-cut the steps and reshape them so people could get down to the river. The spring which provided all the cold water needed was prepared. Ice would be brought out from town and placed in a saw dust lined pit and covered with saw dust. Where would you find saw dust today? With the above circumstances and inconveniences who would be that faithful today?" 32

A storm came through causing damage to the old school and the Church. It blew the Church off of its foundation. The members dismantled what was left of the church, and the lumber was carefully stacked and ready to rebuild.³³

In September of 1921, a hurricane off of the Gulf caused a record breaking rain fall. In Milam and Williamson County flooding became a disaster. The rain came down from Thursday night through Saturday. Thrall, Texas, received a total of 38.21 inches of rain in one 24 hour period. Taylor received 23.11 inches.³⁴ It was believed that 91 people

were drowned or missing due to these floods. The San Gabriel River, Brushy Creek and many of the smaller creeks were on a rampage after these waters got to them. The lowlands in the San Gabriel area were a huge lake. It was said that ten thousand acres of lowland were impacted by the disaster. The wood that had been carefully stacked to rebuild the San Gabriel Christian Church was lost to the flood water. The flood washed away the Penn Tabernacle where all the camp meetings had been held.

After the Flood in 1921, the members decided to build on a higher spot across the road from the old site near the school. Once again Christians met in the Old School while plans were made to rebuild. A building committee composed of Hardin H. Camp, J. M. Gilchrist, W. T. Johnson, and W. H. Camp Sr. bought land from Andrew F. Baird and his wife Annie on October the 4, 1922. This deed is found at the Milam County Court house in Vol. 696 p. 807.

Harden H. Camp was a Member of the San Gabriel Christian Church being baptized by Brother Sears in 1919. Mr. Camp was a successful businessman in Milam County and was the President of the Rockdale State Bank for many years. Mr. Harden H. Camp was the husband of Cenia Whitefield Camp. He was born on August 2, 1870 in Monroe, Georgia, and died on May 25, 1947 in San Gabriel, Texas. Cenia Whitfield Camp was born in Mortons Gap, Kentucky, on November 20, 1875, and died in January of 1936. At the time of her death she was working on copying the old burned records of the San Gabriel Christian Church. Mrs. Camp was a faithful and diligent worker in the church. She was baptized by J. A. Lincoln in 1890. She wrote poetry and a book of her poetry was published .The name of the volume was "The Continuing Voice" of Cenia Whitfield Camp, published in 1937 by Clyde C. Cockrell & Sons, Dallas, Texas. Mrs. Cenia Whitfield Camp's parents were Dr. and Mrs. F. M. Whitfield. Mrs. Leah Whitfield

wore a little white bonnet some of our members recalled. She made the bread for the Lords supper each week and brought it in a little covered basket. Mr. Camp built a beautiful home for his family. It was in the old Southern plantation style. A picture of this home is included. His son Ike Camp was baptized in 1922, and his wife Frances Stephens Camp was baptized in August of 1939 by Mr. Abbot. The couple lived in the home after his mother's death. Mrs. Frances Camp lives in the family home now with her daughter Carol Simank and family. Carol is also a member of this church. She was baptized in February of 1954, at a revival in Rockdale, preached by Roy Brewtin.³⁵

Mr. J. M. Gilchrist, another member of the building committee for the new church, was the Church Clerk from 1919- 1922. He and his wife Hattie Johnson Gilchrist, son Weldon and wife Maebeth were also members of San Gabriel Christian Church. Mrs. Maebeth Gilchrist was a Church trustee and an Elder until infirmity kept her from being active. At that time she was made Elder Emeritus. Their son, John Gilchrist, was an Elder and Chairman of the Board, until he and his wife Rhonda moved to Bryan, Texas. His children are John, Stacy, and Lisa. Weldon and Maebeth's daughters, Claire Gilchrist Fryer and Jane Ann Gilchrist Lange, are on the church roll. Jane Ann passed away in 2004. A son, Joe, and his wife, Margie, were members of the congregation. Joe passed away some time ago. Joe and Margie had four children Trey, Kenneth, Sandra and James. Trey and wife Karen live in the Gilchrist family home.

Mr. Tamp W. Johnson, building committee member, was made an Elder of the Church in November of 1936. He served in that capacity until his death. He joined the Church in 1892. He served as Sunday School Superintendent in the years 1919-1929. He was married to Lena Terry Johnson.

William Hope Camp Sr. joined the San Gabriel Christian Church in 1898. He was married to Annie Felton Camp in 1895. He was the son of Asbury Murrel Camp. Mrs Camp was the daughter of Thomas Walter Felton. Both of these families came to San Gabriel in the mid 1850s. ³⁶

All of their children were members of this church. Mr. Camp was a farmer and a business owner. He owned and operated a cotton gin and a garage in the San Gabriel Community. Mrs. Annie Camp kept the old church bell after the flood. She kept it safe inside her front gate till the present church was built. The bell was found there and repaired. Many members of the church and community contributed to this project of restoring the old bell. Mr. Will Lee, member of a pioneer family who were members of this church, told us in a letter how important that bell was to the whole community. Everyone was glad to have it restored. A bell tower was built to house the historic old bell and it has rung each Sunday and on special occasions since the early fifties. 37

The present church (third building) was built by contractor John Harris on land bought from Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Baird. The Andrew Bairds lived in a home just about where the front of the church is located. Andrew Baird was the son of Henry F. and Lucy Baird. The deed is filed at the Milam County Courthouse in Cameron, Texas, Vol. 698, pp.805-807. The present building was completed in July of 1924 ³⁸

The first couple to be married in the church was Edith Randolph Clark and Floyd Duncan. Mrs. Floyd (Buddy) Duncan was baptized in 1924 by Rev. J. W. Holsapple. Floyd (Buddy) Duncan was baptized by Rev. Klingman in August of 1935. They had two


daughters, Helen Jo Duncan Pierce and Mary Ann Duncan Field. A picture of this couple is included in the appendix.

In the early years, after the third church was built, the decision was made to try and preserve some of our older and important items. Mrs. Ione Culp, wife of Ned Culp, and Mildred Culp, wife of Bremond Culp, had a large wood and glass case made for these items. They constructed a large book out of heavy card board on which they placed the old sketches and the history of our church. The sketch was done in charcoal by A. M. Garrat of New Mexico. In the appendix is a picture of the original charcoal drawing which is stored in this book. This book is over 50 years old at this time and beginning to deteriorate. We will attempt to place some of these items in an acid free environment. This large book, kept in a glass front case, has hung on the wall of our Sanctuary for over 50 years.

Mildred Culp and Mrs. Ione Culp were sisters. These two ladies helped to instill the special feeling most of us have for this church and its congregation. Both of them were teachers and spent many years in that profession. They were also very talented musically and were artistic. Their husbands were brothers and held just about every position in the church. They were faithful members and you could depend on them doing the job they were given. Ned and Ione Culp had one son, Larry Lamond Culp. There are many people all over the country that received some type of musical tutoring from Mrs. Ione Culp. She was very talented at the piano and worked long hours with the vocalist singing in the quartets, duets, and those singing solos. She carefully marked our music books with special notations for breathing, soft, or loud. I still have my choir books and

sheet music with her distinct notes. . We knew a song had hit the mark when Mrs. Ione got goose bumps on her arms. 39

On the next page is a picture of an award certificate received by the Adult Class on February 24, 1909.



It hangs on the wall in the Adult Class. It is very old but it shows the names of all of the members of that Class.

During World War II our community had a lot of its young people in the service.

On December 19, 1941, a care package was sent to each of those servicemen with a hand made card inside with the home made cake, cookies, and candy.

I wrote about the old charcoal sketch of the original Church. It is very fragile and cannot be removed from the big "Faith of Our Fathers" book which contains our church history and old pictures.

Mr. Wallace Allen Conn was a good example of what a faithful and dependable church member should be. He was born on February 19, 1897. His parents were Ira

Boone Conn and Sally Davis Conn. Ira Conn was baptized by J. A. Lincoln in 1895 Mr. Conn's mother, Sally Davis, was a descendant of Cynthia Ann Parker Allen Conn loved farming as did his father, and they did it well. Allen continued working on the family farm after his father's death and did so for over 50 years. He graduated from the old San Gabriel High School. He served as the San Gabriel School Board President for over 20 years. He joined the San Gabriel Christian Church at age 12. Mr. Conn was elected an Elder and served as S.S. Superintendent for 25 years. All of his children were baptized into this church. He married Ruth Davis in 1917. Peter Franklin, Bill, and Mary Elizabeth were born to this union. His wife passed away at a young age. He then met and married Evelyn Modesett who was a teacher. Mrs. Evelyn Conn graduated from Southwest State Teachers College in San Marcus. They had two children, Annabelle Conn Heine and Peggy Allen Conn Seelig. Annabelle Conn Heine and her family still live on the family farm which has long since passed the century mark.⁴⁰

Chester Lee Crow was born in 1906 in Austin, Texas. He is listed in our church's Black Ideal record book as being a minister here in 1928. He served 2 Sundays a month while he was a ministerial student. He received the A. B degree from Texas Christian University in Ft Worth, Texas. He then attended Brite Divinity School in Ft. Worth where he received his B. D. He began his ministry in Mission, Texas, in 1931. He was a minister at Mexia, Lake Charles, Louisiana and was the minister for Hyde Park Christian Church, where he grew up. From 1939 to 1948, he was the Pastor of First Christian Church of Garland, Texas, until his retirement in 1970. In 1948 he was called as Regional director of religious education for Texas. In 1953 he became general secretary for the Texas Board of Christian Churches. After this he became director of the pre-ministerial

program at Eureka, College in Illinois. He was married to Elizabeth Miller. They had five daughters. Articles were written about his death and recorded in the "Disciples" news from the Disciples of Christ.

Chester Crow passed away on September 23, 1984. Mrs. Crow is still teaching and ministering to others. I met Mrs. Crow at Broadway Plaza in Ft Worth when my husband Kenneth Thompson was there after having a stroke which paralyzed his left side. Mrs. Crow was the first visitor we had. We visited daily for 4 months. Her apartment was across from his. She is a resident of Broadway Plaza ALU Unit. Despite her age limitations she teaches Bible Study Class each day at 10.00 a.m. and also visits all the shut-.ins on 3 floors. She told us that she met Mr. Crow when he came to Mission, Texas to be their pastor. She said they had a busy but very happy life. She still attends church every Sunday at University Christian Church.

In 1984 the congregation voted to build an additional building. The decision was made to make it a multi purpose building. Our space was very limited so the building was built next to the Sanctuary. It was built with donations from members, friends of the church, and church members doing the work. The contractor was Gene Kirk Baird. The women of the church prepared meals for the workers. The new building had a kitchen. It gave us needed space for classes, social gatherings, and youth activities. We have outgrown it in 2004.

The church has purchased the property next to us from Mr. and Mrs. Zane Stigall. We now have a large play area, a house that may be used as a parsonage or office. We now have room to build a much larger building to be used as a Family Life center.


Special Celebrations were held on our 75th Anniversary, 100th Anniversary, 125th Anniversary, and on our 149th Anniversary. On the Third Lord's Day in June 1929, our 75th anniversary was observed with Dr. Jewett of the University Bible Chair.

On the Third Lord's Day in June 1954, June the 20th, the 100th Anniversary of the San Gabriel Christian Church was celebrated with Brother Newton Robinson of First Christian Church at Amarillo, Texas, speaker for the morning service. Brother Chester L. Crow was speaker at the afternoon service.

The 125th birthday of the oldest Milam County Church congregation was well attended and a truly joyous success. Dr. John Stewart, professor at Brite Divinity School, T.C.U, highlighted the morning service with a most inspiring message. Reverend Theo McElroy retired minister of Hyde Park Christian in Austin, Texas with another timely message in the afternoon service. Mrs. T. N. Wood, an accomplished pianist, with Mr. Joe Palmaro playing the violin, furnished beautiful music for the service. Special music was presented by Mary Stigall, Larry Culp, Mildred Culp, and the choir. The church would like to thank each person who had a part in the program, Henry Tyler, Rockdale Christian Church, Thorndale Baptist Church.

On October 8, 1997, we became aware of a group of our local people meeting under shade trees and on porches even when the weather was bad. They had formed a small worship group. When our church heard about this it reminded us of our beginnings. We talked to our Latino brother, Jimmy Hinistrozo, who visited our congregation regularly. He talked to them then came back with the details and their hopes for the future. We held a business meeting and the decision was made to offer them the use of our sanctuary for a set period of time while they made plans. They were meeting in the sanctuary in January after our service was over. Each Sunday they left us an unsolicited

donation for the use of the building. The money they left was put away for them to use as "seed" money when their plans were made. The little congregation grew and we had to hurry to leave the parking lot each Sunday so our brothers and sisters would have room to park. The time came when Brother Jimmy gave them a plot of land and they were ready to build. We presented them with their "seed" money. They were surprised and happy to have a head start. It was wonderful to watch God work as donations began to come in for them. Members (providing labor and their special talent) built a lovely building that was completely paid for when it was finished. We sent flowers for their dedication on May 12, 2002. On May 3, 2003, they held their first anniversary celebration. On May 8, 2003, our church voted to send them \$300.00 a month for Sunday School literature. This was to be considered again at the end of six months time.

Shown above are pictures of our choir singing a special at their dedication service and members entering as well as the cover of the program. It has been almost two years now, and they have almost completed an education building. The little group is now a large congregation.

In 2003 the San Gabriel Christian Church joined the Bastrop Baptist Church in a church building mission to Mexico. Supplies that they were able to take with them were gathered and the group left for Mexico. Some members taught a Bible school and craft class for the children while adult church members worked on the building. At night our Pastor friend Jimmy Hinistroza brought the message in Spanish. By the time the group had to leave they had dried the building in and had it roofed. They plan another trip the summer of 2004

Reverend Robert Wimp retired as Senior Pastor at San Gabriel Christian Church in January of 2004 after seventeen years. He lives in Smithville, Texas, with his wife Pat and their son John. On February 16, 2003, the congregation presented him with a car.

Ray Barron was called to be the Senior Minister of San Gabriel Christian Church effective March 1, 2004. Ray Barron and his wife Barbara live in San Gabriel. Barbara Northcott Barron joined this church in 1953. She was baptized by Charles Reader in Taylor.

In July of 2004, our church building will be 80 years old. On the Third Lord's Day in June, 2004, our congregation will be 150 years old. The San Gabriel Christian Church continues to thrive. With the new land purchase next to the Church, our congregation is planning on growth and beginning more projects to continue God's work in our community.

Names of ministers, clerks, and elders are listed in the appendix.


I will close this report with a quote from Mrs. Mildred Culp, given in her speech at the 125th anniversary:

A special note of thanks:






Tombstone for Martha Kolb in the San Andres Cemetery in San Gabriel on FM 908





Commemorative plates and a pencil/ink sketch of the present church by Mary Rowland of Thrall, Texas








